Much of this fur comes from countries that have very weak or no animal welfare laws at all.

# **74,737** signatures

- The UK Parliament e-petitions website allows members of the public to petition the Parliament of the United Kingdom.
- Only British citizens and UK residents can create or sign a petition.
- Petitions can be published online once they have the support of five citizens.
- At 10 000 signatures, the petitioners get a response from the government.
- At 100 000 signatures, the Petitions Committee considers whether there should be a debate on the matter in Parliament.
- Petitions must call for a specific action from the UK Government or the House of Commons.
- Petitions must be about something that the Government or the House of Commons is responsible for.
- Petitions can disagree with the Government and can ask for it to change its policies.

# The European Parliament

- The European Parliament has a single chamber of 751 MEPs.
- New laws are drafted by the European Commission and then sent to the European Parliament for approval.
- MEPs elect a President of the European Parliament who chairs their debates and represents the Parliament, both within the EU and internationally.
- The President of the European Parliament's signature is required in order to enact most laws.

# The President of the United States of America

The President of the USA (POTUS) is both the head of the executive branch of government and also the head of state. The US Constitution prevents the President from being a member of Congress (the legislature) at the same time.

The President is directly elected every four years, with Congress elected separately. Although it is almost impossible to remove a President once they are in office, no President is allowed to be elected to serve more than two four-year terms in office.
