Section AAnswer Question 01.

Source A

From a speech by James Henry Hammond, Senator for South Carolina, to the US Senate, 4 March 1858.

The South has sustained the North in great measure. You (the North) fetch and carry for us. One hundred and fifty million dollars of our money passes annually through your hands. It assists to keep your machinery together and in motion. Suppose we were to discharge you; suppose we were to take our business out of your hands; we should consign you to anarchy and poverty. You complain of the rule of the South; that has been the force that has preserved you in your affluence. We have kept the Government conservative to the great purposes of the Constitution. We have placed it, and kept it, upon the Constitution; and that has been the cause of your peace and prosperity. 5

Source B

From 'The Cotton Kingdom: a traveller's observations' by Frederick Law Olmsted, published in 1861. Olmsted was a Northern journalist who carried out research in the Southern states in the 1850s.

Let a man be absent from the North for twenty years, and he is struck, on his return, by the 'improvements' which we have made: better buildings, churches, schoolhouses, mills, railroads and much more. It is not difficult to see where the profits of our manufacturers and merchants are. But where will the returning traveller see the accumulated cotton profits of twenty years in the South? Ask the cotton-planter for them, and he will point not to libraries, churches, schoolhouses, mills, railroads or anything else; he will point to the increased number of slaves he owns and almost nothing else. The total increase in wealth of the southern population during the last twenty years shows for almost nothing. 5
