Source A

From a speech given by Lenin, on his return to Petrograd, to a sailors' guard of honour at the railway station, April 1917.

Comrade sailors, I greet you without knowing as yet whether or not you have been convinced by all the promises of the Provisional Government. But I am sure that when they talk to you sweetly, when they promise you a lot, they are deceiving you and the whole Russian people. The people need peace; the people need bread; the people need land. What the government gives you is war, hunger, no bread and leaves the landlords still on the land. The Russian revolution accomplished by you has opened a new era. Sailors, comrades, you must fight for the social revolution, fight to the end, until the complete victory of the proletariat. Long live the world-wide social revolution!

Source B

From an article, 'Our differences', written by Kamenev and published in the Bolshevik newspaper, Pravda, April 1917.

In yesterday's issue of Pravda, Comrade Lenin published his 'theses'. These represent the personal opinion of Comrade Lenin. By publishing these 'theses', Comrade Lenin has submitted his understanding of current events to the judgement of others. As regards Comrade Lenin's general argument, it appears to those of us Bolsheviks working in Petrograd, unacceptable. It derives from the assumption that the bourgeois-democratic revolution has been completed and that there should be an immediate transformation of this revolution into a socialist revolution. The tactics that follow from such a belief are very different from the tactics which we have followed so far. We must ensure that the Social Democrats remain the party of the revolutionary masses and must not be swayed by propagandists.
