- How the Beveridge Report (1942) proposed to help people with physical disabilities or illnesses.
- Political beliefs that have subsequently affected the approaches taken by governments to health and social care provision The New Right (Conservative government from 1979) and the Third Way (New Labour).
- The impact of the NHS and Community care Act (1990) and the Disability Discrimination Act (2005)/NI Order (2006) on service provision.
- An analysis of the services provided by the "mixed economy of care" for clients with physical disabilities and illnesses.
- How a hospice may be funded.
- An analysis of the physical, intellectual, emotional and social needs of patients with life threatening illnesses and how they could be met in a hospice.

- Examples of rationing within the NHS and the impact on clients with disabilities or illnesses, on their families and on service providers.

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
