- 3 (a) Present a case for and discuss why Columbanus should be accepted as the greatest missionary of the Celtic Church. [30]
- (b) Critically assess the claim that the monastic discipline of Columbanus is irrelevant today. [20]
- 4 (a) Outline and explain the issues and the conclusion reached over the dating of Easter at the Synod of Whitby. [30]
- (b) Critically evaluate the view that the differences between Celtic and Roman Christianity were of minimal importance. [20]
