## 1 Translate into **Arabic**:

There is a popular programme currently being shown on television, where people bring something that is special to them and in need of repair to a team of restorers who work together in a workshop. The presenters ask what the item means to the guests and why they want it to be repaired at this time in their lives. The objects are often ordinary, but the stories behind them are moving. For example, a clock in the shape of a ship that had not worked for many years. It was the last present given to a girl by her grandfather to remind her of his travels around the world. Or a musical instrument, once the valued possession of a family member, but in such poor condition that it could no longer be played. When the owners return to see what the experts have done, the majority say that they now feel closer to the person to whom the item belonged and that it will be passed down to their children. It is not unusual to see men and women in tears. Who would have thought that objects could create such powerful memories and emotions?

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
