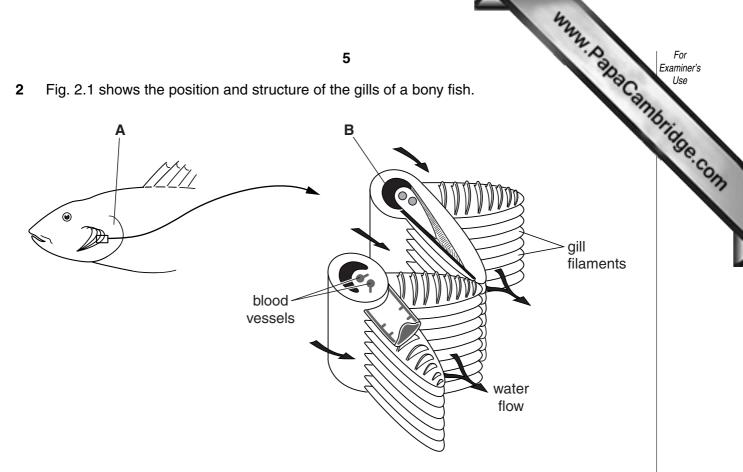

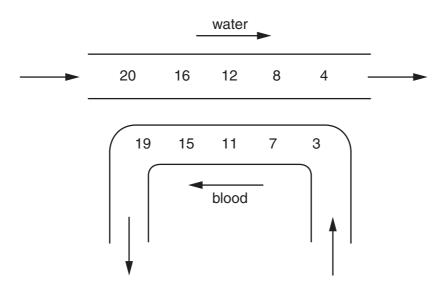

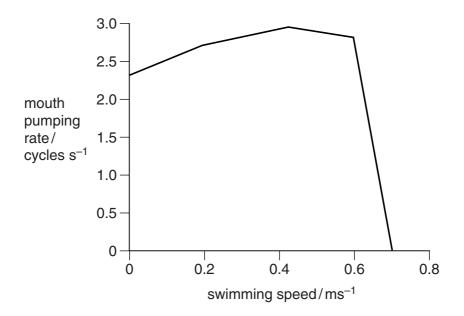

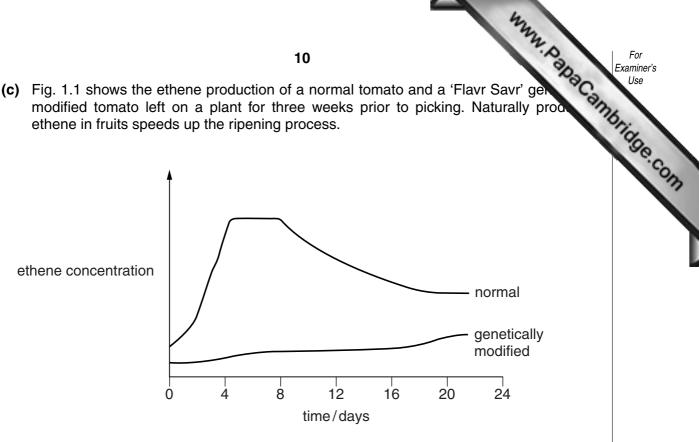

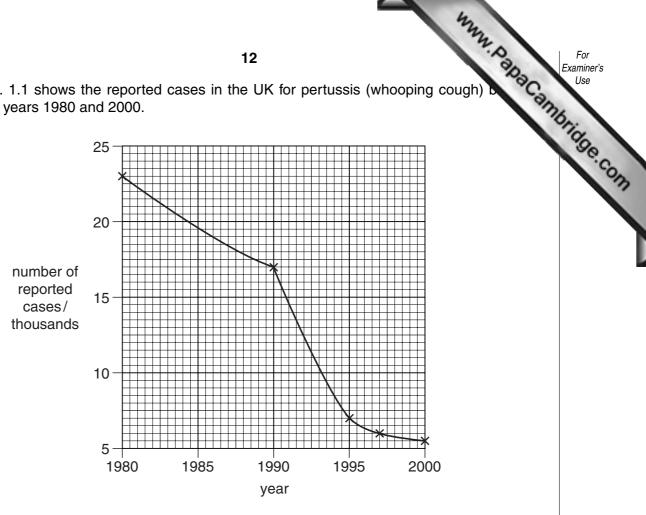

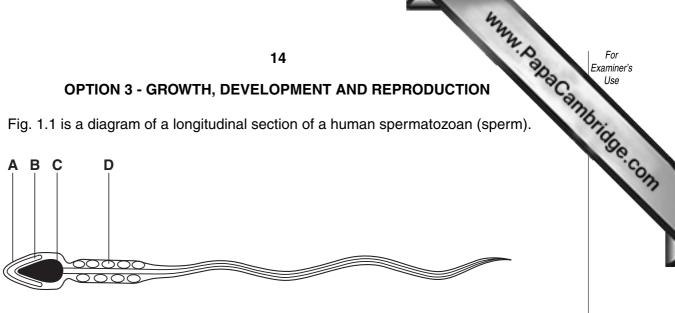

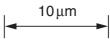

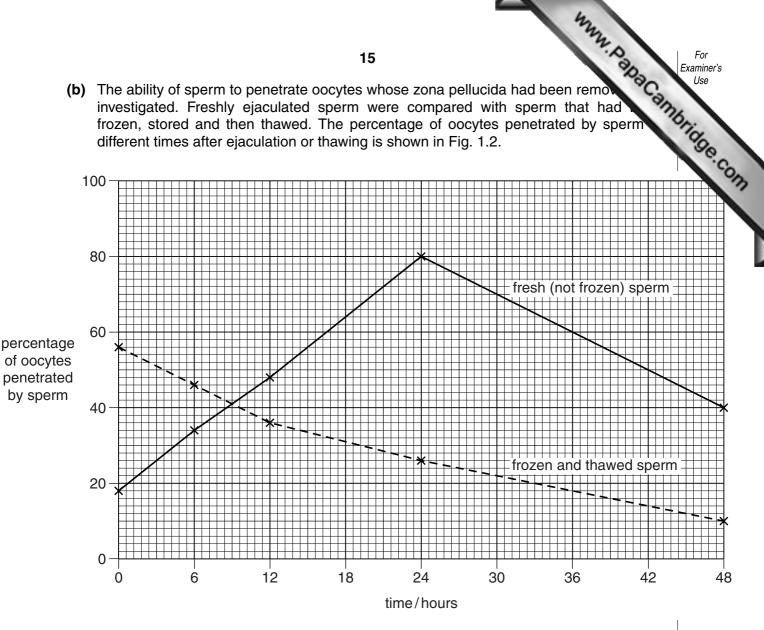

Some species of tropical ginger plants have two distinct phenotypes, $\bf A$ and $\bf B$, that coexist in all populations. Phenotypes $\bf A$ and $\bf B$ differ in the behaviour of the anthers and stigmas of their flowers. In both phenotypes, the flowers open for only one day and the behaviour of the flowers of each phenotype is synchronised in all plants in the population. The differences between the two phenotypes are shown in Table 1.1.
