Section A: Athens and Sparta

Answer Question 1 and either Question 2 or Question 3.

1 Read the passage and answer the question.

The Spartans have requested assistance from the Athenians after an earthquake.

Ephialtes opposed the request and exhorted the Athenians not to attempt to rescue or restore a city which was their rival but rather to let Sparta's pride be trampled underfoot. Cimon, on the other hand, put Sparta's interests before his own country's ambitions and persuaded the Athenians to send a large force of hoplites to her aid. Ion actually records the phrase used by Cimon which did most to sway the people: he appealed to them 'not to allow Greece to go lame, or their own city to be deprived of its yoke-fellow'.

As they bustled about obediently, he muttered through his tears, 'Dead! And so great an artist!'
