- 1 Fig. 1.1 shows a candle holder to be used on a restaurant table.



- (c) Explain the changes which may be necessary to the design, the manufacturing method used and the material selected, if 100 identical candle holders were required.



Fig. 4.1 shows a modern cycle frame.




- (a) Describe the benefits of using alloys and/or new materials in the manufacture of bicycle frames. [10]

Fig. 8.1 shows an outline of the room in which the interactive display will be set up.



Section B

You should approach the design question of your choice in the following manner:

Analysis

Produce an analysis of the given situation/problem, which may be in written or graphical form. [5]

Specification

From the analysis produce a detailed written specification of the design requirements. Include at least five specification points other than those given in the question.

Exploration

Use bold sketches and brief notes to show your exploration of ideas for a design solution, with reasons for selection. [25]

Development

Show using bold sketches and notes, the development, reasoning and composition of ideas into a single design proposal. Give details of materials, constructional and other relevant technical details.

Proposed solution

Produce drawings of an appropriate kind to show the complete solution.

Evaluation

Give a written evaluation of the final design solution.

10 Families use outdoor space to enable young children to play under supervision.

You are to design an outdoor play area that will allow a child to experience different fun activities. Maximum space available is $5m \times 5m$.

The play area must be:

- arranged in different configurations for at least two play activities
- suitable for use by children aged 4–10 years.

11 Market traders who sell clothes need to store their products and display them to potential customers.

You are to design a product that can store and display a range of clothing to allow customers to browse and select items.

The product must be:

- easily moved into position at the market and securely fixed when in place
- easily assembled and disassembled.

12 Many students and workers use their mobile device (phone or tablet) at home or when out of the office to communicate with friends or colleagues.

A new broadband company wishes to distribute a free gift to potential customers.

You are to design:

- a name and logo for a new broadband company
- a product that would hold a mobile device in an appropriate position when in use.

The product must be:

- produced as flat pack
- able to be used for a range of mobile devices.

Details of mobile devices are given in Fig. 12.1.


