- 1 A curve is defined parametrically by

$$x = at^2, \quad y = at,$$

where  $a$  is a positive constant. The part of the curve joining the point where  $t = 0$  to the point where  $t = \sqrt{2}$  is rotated through one complete revolution about the  $x$ -axis. Show that the area of the surface obtained is  $\frac{13}{3}\pi a^2$ . [4]

- 2 Express

$$\frac{2n+3}{n(n+1)}$$

in partial fractions and hence use the method of differences to find

$$\sum_{n=1}^N \frac{2n+3}{n(n+1)} \left(\frac{1}{3}\right)^{n+1}$$

in terms of  $N$ . [4]

Deduce the value of

$$\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{2n+3}{n(n+1)} \left(\frac{1}{3}\right)^{n+1}. \quad [1]$$

- 3 Prove by induction that, for all  $n \geq 1$ ,

$$\frac{d^n}{dx^n}(e^{x^2}) = P_n(x)e^{x^2},$$

where  $P_n(x)$  is a polynomial in  $x$  of degree  $n$  with the coefficient of  $x^n$  equal to  $2^n$ . [6]

- 4 The roots of the equation

$$x^3 - 8x^2 + 5 = 0$$

are  $\alpha, \beta, \gamma$ . Show that

$$\alpha^2 = \frac{5}{\beta + \gamma}. \quad [4]$$

It is given that the roots are all real. Without reference to a graph, show that one of the roots is negative and the other two roots are positive. [3]

- 5 The positive variables  $x$  and  $y$  are related by

$$y = x^2 + 2 \ln(xy).$$

Find the values of  $\frac{dy}{dx}$  and  $\frac{d^2y}{dx^2}$  when both  $x$  and  $y$  are equal to 1. [7]

- 6 The points  $A$ ,  $B$  and  $C$  have position vectors  $2\mathbf{i}$ ,  $3\mathbf{j}$  and  $4\mathbf{k}$  respectively. Find a vector perpendicular to the plane  $\Pi_1$  containing  $A$ ,  $B$  and  $C$ .

The plane  $\Pi_2$  has equation

$$\mathbf{r} = \mathbf{i} + 4\mathbf{j} + 2\mathbf{k} + \lambda(\mathbf{i} - \mathbf{j}) + \mu(\mathbf{j} - \mathbf{k}).$$

Find the acute angle between the planes  $\Pi_1$  and  $\Pi_2$ . [5]

- 7 The curve  $C$  has polar equation

$$r = \theta \sin \theta,$$

where  $0 \leq \theta \leq \pi$ . Draw a sketch of  $C$ . [2]

Find the area of the region enclosed by  $C$ , leaving your answer in terms of  $\pi$ . [7]

- 8 Let  $I_n = \int_0^{\ln 2} (e^x + e^{-x})^n dx$ .

(i) Show that

$$\frac{d}{dx} [(e^x - e^{-x})(e^x + e^{-x})^{n-1}] = n(e^x + e^{-x})^n - 4(n-1)(e^x + e^{-x})^{n-2}. \quad [3]$$

(ii) Hence show that

$$nI_n = 4(n-1)I_{n-2} + \frac{3}{2}\left(\frac{5}{2}\right)^{n-1}. \quad [2]$$

(iii) Use the result in part (ii) to find the  $y$ -coordinate of the centroid of the region bounded by the axes, the line  $x = \ln 2$  and the curve

$$y = (e^x + e^{-x})^2.$$

Give your answer correct to 3 decimal places. [5]

- 9 Write down, in any form, all the roots of the equation  $z^5 - 1 = 0$ . [2]

Hence find all the roots of the equation

$$(w-1)^4 + (w-1)^3 + (w-1)^2 + w = 0,$$

and deduce that none of them is real. [4]

Find the arguments of the two roots which have the smaller modulus. [4]

10 The vectors  $\mathbf{b}_1, \mathbf{b}_2, \mathbf{b}_3, \mathbf{b}_4$  are defined as follows:

$$\mathbf{b}_1 = \begin{pmatrix} 1 \\ 0 \\ 0 \\ 0 \end{pmatrix}, \quad \mathbf{b}_2 = \begin{pmatrix} 1 \\ 1 \\ 0 \\ 0 \end{pmatrix}, \quad \mathbf{b}_3 = \begin{pmatrix} 1 \\ 1 \\ 1 \\ 0 \end{pmatrix}, \quad \mathbf{b}_4 = \begin{pmatrix} 1 \\ 1 \\ 1 \\ 1 \end{pmatrix}.$$

The linear space spanned by  $\mathbf{b}_1, \mathbf{b}_2, \mathbf{b}_3$  is denoted by  $V_1$  and the linear space spanned by  $\mathbf{b}_1, \mathbf{b}_2, \mathbf{b}_4$  is denoted by  $V_2$ .

(i) Give a reason why  $V_1 \cup V_2$  is not a linear space. [1]

(ii) State the dimension of the linear space  $V_1 \cap V_2$  and write down a basis. [2]

Consider now the set  $V_3$  of all vectors of the form  $q\mathbf{b}_2 + r\mathbf{b}_3 + s\mathbf{b}_4$ , where  $q, r, s$  are real numbers. Show that  $V_3$  is a linear space, and show also that it has dimension 3. [3]

Determine whether each of the vectors

$$\begin{pmatrix} 4 \\ 4 \\ 2 \\ 5 \end{pmatrix} \quad \text{and} \quad \begin{pmatrix} 5 \\ 4 \\ 2 \\ 5 \end{pmatrix}$$

belongs to  $V_3$  and justify your conclusions. [4]

11 Find the eigenvalues of the matrix

$$\mathbf{A} = \begin{pmatrix} -1 & 1 & 4 \\ 1 & 1 & -1 \\ 2 & 1 & 1 \end{pmatrix}$$

and corresponding eigenvectors. [7]

The matrix  $\mathbf{B}$  is defined by

$$\mathbf{B} = \mathbf{A} - k\mathbf{I},$$

where  $\mathbf{I}$  is the  $3 \times 3$  identity matrix and  $k$  is a real number. Find a non-singular matrix  $\mathbf{P}$  and a diagonal matrix  $\mathbf{D}$  such that

$$\mathbf{B}^3 = \mathbf{PDP}^{-1}. \quad [4]$$

12 Answer only **one** of the following two alternatives.

**EITHER**

The curve  $C$  has equation

$$y = \frac{ax^2 + bx + c}{x + 4},$$

where  $a$ ,  $b$  and  $c$  are constants. It is given that  $y = 2x - 5$  is an asymptote of  $C$ .

- (i) Find the values of  $a$  and  $b$ . [3]
- (ii) Given also that  $C$  has a turning point at  $x = -1$ , find the value of  $c$ . [3]
- (iii) Find the set of values of  $y$  for which there are no points on  $C$ . [4]
- (iv) Draw a sketch of the curve with equation

$$y = \frac{2(x - 7)^2 + 3(x - 7) - 2}{x - 3}. \quad [3]$$

[You should state the equations of the asymptotes and the coordinates of the turning points.]

**OR**

Show that the substitution  $y = \frac{1}{w}$  reduces the differential equation

$$y \frac{d^2y}{dx^2} + 2y \frac{dy}{dx} - 2 \left( \frac{dy}{dx} \right)^2 - 5y^2 = (5x^2 + 4x + 2)y^3$$

to

$$\frac{d^2w}{dx^2} + 2 \frac{dw}{dx} + 5w = -5x^2 - 4x - 2. \quad [4]$$

Find the general solution for  $w$  in terms of  $x$ . [6]

Find a function  $f$  such that  $\lim_{x \rightarrow \infty} \left( \frac{y}{f(x)} \right) = 1$ . [3]
