Section A: The Sociological Perspective

- 1 “Functionalist theorists have exaggerated the amount of consensus in society.” Explain and assess this view. [25]
- 2 Assess the *realist* theory that there are more similarities than differences between sociology and the natural sciences. [25]

Section B: Sociological Methods

- 3 “Official statistics provide a distorted picture of social reality. For this reason, they have little value in sociological research.” Explain and assess this view. [25]
- 4 “Much can go wrong when carrying out *covert* participant observation. The risks with this research method outweigh the rewards.” Explain and assess this claim. [25]

Section C: Social Differentiation and Stratification

- 5 “Post-modernist writers have exposed the weaknesses in traditional sociological theories of class.” Explain and assess this view. [25]
- 6 “In modern industrial societies, the poor are trapped in poverty by their dependence on welfare benefits.” Explain and assess this view. [25]
