2 Read carefully the following extract from a novel. Uma is a woman who lives at home looking after her elderly parents. She suffers from occasional fits. They are being visited by Aruna, her younger married sister, and family who have come to bathe in the holy river near to where Uma lives.

## How does the writer vividly portray Uma's experience at the river?

To help you answer this question, you might consider:

- how the writer creates an atmosphere of excited anticipation amongst Uma and the guests
- how she portrays Uma's jump into the river and her rescue
- how she conveys Uma's thoughts and feelings about the experience.

All that Uma enjoyed of that visit was the trip on the river in the big flat-bottomed boat they hired to hold all the guests who had come to take the ritual bath.
