Instructions for preparing apparatus

www.papaCambridge.com These instructions detail the apparatus, reagents and specimens required by each candidate experiment in this paper. A summary of the questions that will be presented to the candidate included, where appropriate, to allow the teacher to test the apparatus appropriately. No access permitted to the question paper in advance of the examination session.

It is assumed that the ordinary apparatus of a science laboratory will be available, including a supply of purified water (distilled or deionised).

It is expected that candidates will have either a watch or sight of a clock with second hand.

If arrangements are made for different sessions for different groups of candidates, care must be taken to ensure that the different groups of candidates are effectively isolated so that no information passes between them.

For Question 1

Each candidate will require:

- 8 test-tubes, size 125 x15 mm; (i)
- (ii) 6 small labels for the test-tubes;
- (iii) a test-tube rack;
- 5 syringes of volume 5 cm^3 ; (iv)
- 1 syringe of volume 1 cm^3 ; (v)

If there is a limited supply of syringes, one 5 cm³ and one 1 cm³ syringe could be given to each candidate with instructions and the means to wash out the syringes. Similarly if no syringes are available, 10 cm³ measuring cylinders could be used instead.

- 10 cm³ of 2% amylase solution; (vi)
- 10 cm³ of 1% starch solution; (vii)
- approximately 20 cm³ of deionised (distilled) water; (viii)
 - 10 cm³ of 1% pepsin solution; (ix)
 - 10 cm³ of protein solution. This should be made as follows: Boil the white of an egg in 1 dm³ (x) of deionised water. Filter the solution through a coarse cloth, e.g. muslin to remove the large particles. The resulting filtrate should be cloudy.

The volumes of the solutions are generous in quantity for the practical. However, extra should be available if the candidates request it.

- hydrochloric acid of concentration approximately 1 mol dm⁻³; (xi)
- access to iodine solution: (xii)
- access to a water bath set at approximately 40 °C. There should be a means of support for 6 (xiii) test-tubes:

The tubes are to be kept at approximately 40 °C for 5 minutes. It is acceptable to use alternatives to a water bath and for the temperature of the water to fall slightly during the 5 minute period. A controlled temperature of approximately 40 °C is required later in the question and the warm water may need replacing if a water bath is not used.

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- (xiv) a white tile.
- (xv) a glass rod;
- (xvi) a paper towel;
- (xvii) a stopwatch or clock clearly visible;
- (xviii) a small filter funnel;
- www.papacambridge.com (xix) a piece of coarse material e.g. gauze or muslin, suitable for lining the filter funnel;
- (xx) a Bunsen burner;
- (xxi) a test-tube holder.

Note

The amylase solution should be capable of breaking down the starch solution in 5 minutes at 40 °C when mixed in 2:2:1 ratio of starch, amylase and water.

The pepsin solution must be capable of breaking down the protein solution in 5 minutes at 40 °C when mixed in a ratio of 2:2:1 of pepsin, protein solution and acid.

For Question 2

Each candidate will require:

- (i) about 30 g of plasticine (modelling clay);
- (ii) a ruler calibrated in mm;
- (iii) access to a balance reading to the nearest gram;
- (iv) 100 cm³ measuring cylinder;
- (v) metre rule
- (vi) a knife edge for balancing the metre rule or other suitable pivot;
- a retort stand and clamp for holding the pivot or suitable alternative; (vii)
- (viii) a 25 g mass;
 - (ix) thread to attach plasticine and 25 g mass to the rule;
 - paper towel or tissue to dry the plasticine. (x)

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For Question 3

Each candidate will require:

www.papaCambridge.com a bung to fit a 125 x 15 mm hard glass test-tube. The test-tube should contain a short leng (i) of glass tubing which is connected to a piece of rubber tubing to act as a delivery tube. See Fig. 3.1;



- (ii) two stands and clamps;
- a 100 cm³ measuring cylinder; (iii)
- (iv) a water trough;
- (v) four test-tubes 125 x 15 mm;
- between 0.30 g and 0.40 g accurately weighed of sodium hydrogencarbonate in a (vi) 125 x 15 mm hard glass test-tube. This should preferably be taken from a fresh sample. The mass should be clearly labelled and given to the candidate. It should also indicate that this sample is to be used for part (a);
- a second sample of about 0.2 g of sodium hydrogencarbonate in a suitable container labelled (vii) substance X:
- access to limewater, dilute hydrochloric acid, Universal Indicator solution and a colour chart. (viii)

Spare materials and equipment should be available and can be provided without penalty. Candidates should be made aware of this.

Information required from the Supervisor:

The Supervisor is asked to carry out the experiments and to enter the results on a spare copy of the examination paper, clearly marked 'Supervisor's Results' and showing the Centre number. This should be returned with the scripts. Failure to do so may cause the candidates to be penalised.
