## Section A: The Family

- 1 The family has undergone many changes in modern industrial society. One of them is the move from extended family to nuclear family.
- (a) What is meant by the term *extended family*? [2]
- (b) Describe **two** reasons for the decline of the extended family in modern industrial societies. [4]
- (c) Explain how roles within the nuclear family are changing. [6]
- (d) To what extent has there been a loss of family functions in modern industrial societies? [8]
- 2 In modern industrial societies many women now work in paid employment. It is said that they have a 'dual burden'.
- (a) What is meant by the term *dual burden*? [2]
- (b) Describe **two** traditional male roles within the family. [4]
- (c) Explain the effect on family life of mothers working in paid employment. [6]
- (d) To what extent is there equality within the family today? [8]

## Section B: Education

- 3 There is a debate in sociology over whether modern educational systems are meritocratic.
- (a) What is meant by the term *meritocratic*? [2]
- (b) Describe **two** examples of what pupils learn at school outside the official curriculum. [4]
- (c) Explain how streaming may affect the educational performance of pupils. [6]
- (d) To what extent do schools treat all ethnic groups equally? [8]
- 4 It is said that some children are disadvantaged in school because they lack cultural capital.
- (a) What is meant by the term *cultural capital*? [2]
- (b) Describe **two** ways in which home factors may influence educational achievement. [4]
- (c) Explain how working class pupils may be disadvantaged by the middle class nature of schools. [6]
- (d) To what extent is the peer group the main influence on educational achievement? [8]

### Section C: Crime, Deviance and Social Control

- 5 In order to maintain law and order in modern industrial societies, formal social control is necessary.
- (a) What is meant by the term *formal social control*? [2]
- (b) Describe **two** sanctions that may be used to maintain law and order. [4]
- (c) Explain what sociological factors may lead a person to commit crime. [6]
- (d) To what extent is informal social control important in maintaining law and order in modern industrial societies? [8]
- 6 It is said that some individuals in society are affected by anomie. Some people may also experience status frustration.
- (a) What is meant by the term *anomie*? [2]
- (b) Describe **two** groups who may experience status frustration. [4]
- (c) Explain why a high proportion of recorded crime is committed by just a few groups in society. [6]
- (d) To what extent is crime the result of inequality in society? [8]

### Section D: Media

- 7 The media are often criticised for producing distorted views of particular individuals or groups in society. The media have also been blamed for creating folk devils and moral panics.
- (a) What is meant by the term *folk devils*? [2]
- (b) Describe **two** examples of moral panics. [4]
- (c) Explain how media reporting may create a distorted view of an individual or group. [6]
- (d) To what extent do the media shape the norms of society? [8]
- 8 People use the media in different ways. This is particularly the case with the new media, which are replacing the traditional media.
- (a) What is meant by the term *traditional media*? [2]
- (b) Describe **two** ways in which individuals may use the media. [4]
- (c) Explain why the use of new technologies has led to the decline of the traditional media. [6]
- (d) To what extent is age the main influence on how people use the media? [8]
