Question Number	Answer		
1	Assess the importance of Gandhi for Hindus today.		
	<b>AO1</b> Candidates will need to explain the teachings and behaviour of Gandhi.		
	Candidates might explore Gandhi's role in seeking independence from the British, though a purely political answer, without sufficient religious context, would not constitute a good response.		
	Candidates should be aware of some of Gandhi's religious ideas, for example his emphasis on the concept of ahimsa, or his views on other religions.		
	Candidates might explore the continuing repercussions of Gandhi's political and religious attitudes.		
	<b>AO2</b> Candidates might refer to the continuing political importance of Gandhi's actions at the time of Indian independence.		
	Candidate might explore the continued widespread respect for Gandhi in a range of religious traditions.		
	Good responses might explain religious responses to Gandhi's teachings, for example ahimsa, before reaching a conclusion.	[35]	
2	'Ahimsa is more important than dharma in Hindu ethics.' Discuss with reference to environmental issues.		
	AO1 Candidates need to explain the concepts of ahimsa and dharma in some detail.		
	Candidates are likely to make reference to the teachings of Gandhi and the teachings of the Bhagavad Gita to illustrate the concepts above.		
	Some candidates might explain the concept of varnashramadharma, and its influence on Hinduism.		
	Good responses might explain a range of Hindu ethical considerations, showing how they relate to ahimsa and dharma.		

Question Number	Answer		
2 cont'd	<b>AO2</b> Candidates might argue that ahimsa is of less importance than dharma, perhaps giving the example of Arjuna's dilemma in the Bhagavad Gita as evidence.		
	Candidates might assess the importance of ahimsa in the teachings and behaviour of Gandhi.		
	Good responses are likely to assess whether different ethical attitudes are prevalent in different schools of Hinduism, before reaching a conclusion.	[35]	
3	3 To what extent is the purpose of the Bhagavad Gita to elevate the status of the bhakti path?		
	<b>AO1</b> Candidates are likely to explain the account of Krishna's transfiguration, though a merely descriptive account would not be a good response.		
	Candidates need to explain the importance of the transfiguration for the elevation of the bhakti path.		
	Candidates might explain the importance of karma without thought of reward as explained within the Bhagavad Gita.		
	Candidates are also likely to refer to Arjuna's dilemma and the implications for dharma raised by this.		
	<b>AO2</b> Candidates might argue that bhakti is the most important teaching within the Bhagavad Gita, evidenced by the importance of Krishna within the text.		
	Candidates might assess the relative importance of other teachings in the Bhagavad Gita such as karma and dharma.		
	Good responses might consider the history and importance of the Bhagavad Gita before reaching a conclusion.	[35]

4	<ul> <li>Assess the importance of meditation for those seeking moksha.</li> <li>AO1 Candidates might answer from the perspective of any Hindu tradition they have studied, or consider ideas from a range of traditions.</li> <li>Candidates might explain the purpose of the postures for releasing energy through the chakras in Hatha yoga.</li> <li>Candidates might also refer to the visualisations or mantras used by those meditators following the bhakti path.</li> <li>Good responses might explain alternative paths to moksha, such as jnana, bhakti and karma.</li> <li>AO2 Candidates might argue that meditation is an integral part of the path to moksha, and thus of prime importance.</li> <li>Candidates might assess the relationship between meditation and Hindu concepts such as varnashramadharma, before offering an evaluation of</li> </ul>	
	its importance. Candidates might explore whether the importance of meditation varies within different schools.	[35]
